


What is a hazard?

A source of danger or risk.









What is the meaning of mitigation?

To make something less dangerous, serious, or painful.





What is risk?





 $RISK = HAZARD \times EXPOSURE$






Prince George's County's Frequent Hazards

Flood


A flood is an overflow of water that submerge land that is usually dry.







What is a flood plain?





A flood plain is a generally flat area of land next to a river or stream.

Mitigation Actions for a Flood-prone Area

- Flood barrier/wall
 - Elevation
- Avoid living close to coastlines or flood plains

Tornado

A tornado is a narrow, violently rotating column of air that extends from a thunderstorm to the ground.














Mitigation Actions for a Tornado

- Construction of a safe room in houses, schools, and nursing homes
- Laminated or impact-residential glass
- Reinforced garage doors
- Window shutters







Fire


A fire involves the destructive components of burning.



An air mass of high temperature covering an extended area and moving relatively slowly.








Mitigation Actions for Extreme Heat

- Find air-conditioning
- Avoid intense physical activities
- Wear light clothing
- Drink plenty of fluids
- Watch heat cramps, exhaustion and stroke
- Never leave people or pets in a closed car
- Check on family members and neighbors







Snowstorm

A heavy fall of snow, especially with a high wind.
