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LETTER FROM THE COUNTY EXECUTIVE


Dear Prince Georgians,

My great-grandmother passed down our family's story, always reminding me: If you see something you don't like, don't complain—do something about it.

I was raised in Camp Springs, and today I live in Upper Marlboro, where I've raised my daughter Alex. Growing up, I saw kindness, community, and hope in every Prince Georgian, but I also saw challenges that needed to be addressed. I decided I wouldn't just complain; I would act.

As I entered public service, I listened to residents share concerns about education, the economy, and public safety. Over time, a coalition of men and women grew around a simple desire to build a stronger, healthier, and more prosperous County for future generations. 

Business Compliance

- Launched the Stepped Up Enforcement Initiative to ensure the safety and quality of services offered to residents and visitors
 - Initiated comprehensive outreach campaign, hosting multiple townhalls and community meetings about local business
 - · Distributed over 6,000 pieces of education
 - Investigated more than 600 complaints identifying unlicensed home-based businesses and enterprises

Technology and Connectivity

- Implemented the first Zero Trust Cyber Security Strategy, bringing County Government in line with industry best practices
- Established the first AI Framework, Policy & Strategy to help automate tasks such as contract authorizations, improve decision-making by analyzing large data sets
- Expanded broadband access by joining the Maryland Broadband Local Jurisdiction Workgroup, accelerating implementation of successful broadband projects



Facilities and Infrastructure

- Awarded a \$25.4M grant through the Federal Transit Administration's Low or No Program



2024 LEGISLATIVE RECAP

During the Maryland Legislative Session, we work collaboratively to make our community better by turning challenges into new opportunities and passing laws that help everyone in Prince George's County. This year, we teamed up with the Prince George's County Council, state lawmakers, and other important leaders to make a real difference during the 2024 session. Even during a tight budget cycle, we focused on important projects securing \$198 million in state funding to improve healthcare, support our local economy, and make our neighborhoods safer and stronger.

Why We Focused on These Investments

Our investments were guided by a report that showed serious gaps in healthcare in our County, including the shortage of physicians and hospital beds. We want all residents to have access to the quality care they need and aim to create more opportunities for our community to thrive.

Key Investments Made:

Investments in Health and Climate Equity

- \$10M for a new hospital in Southern PGC
- \$19M for the Luminis Health Women's Health Tower to expand OB/GYN care
- \$1.4M to modernize the Luminis Health Emergency Department
- \$1M for the Medstar Southern Maryland ICU bed expansion, which will help construct a 30-bed critical care tower
- \$2.5M to expand the Capital Region Ella medical office building
- \$1.5M for the CCI Health Services facility expansion
- \$2.9M for the Greater Baden Medical Clinic
- \$10.4M for the Calvert Hills stormwater project, aimed at upgrading storm drain systems in College Park and Calvert Hills

Economic and Social Investments


- \$16.9M for infrastructure improvements at the Capitol Heights Metro Station to increase transit-oriented development around Capitol Heights
- \$16.8M to build the Pavilion at Lottsford, boosting the Blue Line Corridor to help businesses grow and create new jobs
- \$5M to create a film studio and soundstage in our Arts and Entertainment District, growing the entertainment industry and bringing in new opportunities
- \$7.5M for the Cheverly Hospital
 Redevelopment project, which will bring over
 \$1 billion in investments to our community
- \$250,000 for Liberty Sports Park
- \$3.1M to revitalize the Rosecroft Raceway

Moving forward, we are committed to building on our accomplishments. We want every resident of Prince George's County to benefit from our progress. There is still work to be done, but together, we are making our County healthier, stronger, and better connected. By listening to our residents, working together, and focusing on what matters most, we can keep making Prince George's County a great place to live and thrive.

FY25 PROUD INVESTMENTS

The approved FY 2025 budget for Prince George's County reflects a commitment to the County's strategic policy to making critical investments as we chart a path forward. The approved FY 2025 budget is \$5.5 billion, reflecting an increase of \$92.2 million, or 1.7%, over FY 2024. This budget builds on our strong financial foundation by prioritizing education, public safety, economic development, and quality of life improvements. Investments include \$2.83 billion for the Board of Education to support employee compensation, universal pre-kindergarten, and special programs like Immersion and Special Education expansions. Public safety funding covers 100 new police recruits, 2 new crime scene investigator roles, and 27 additional Fire/EMS positions with support for 100 new recruits. The budget also provides for 36 new corrections staff, interpreter services for the State's Attorney's Office, a Health Department Communications Specialist, and the Crisis Stabilization Call Center. Programs to aid at-risk youth, reduce childhood hunger, and expand the Summer Youth Enrichment Program are also funded.
