






Residential Street Sweeping Program














- DPW&T initiated Phase I of Prince Geoge's County's Residential Street Sweeping Program (RSSP) on September 3, 2024.
- Now complete, Phase I serviced approximately 1,378 curb-miles of 11 sweeping zones in residential communities, utilizing five (5) street sweepers on a five (5) week rotation.
 - Litter Collected: 263 tons
- Phase II, countywide service scheduled to begin in Spring 2025, will service approximately 1,571 curb-miles of roadways each month.



Growing Green With Pride



Twice each year, Prince George's County invites residents to participate in 'Growing Green with Pride,' a community cleanup initiative supporting the county's Beautification Proud Priority. The biannual event unites Prince George's County communities to combat litter accumulation across County streets, parking lots, and beyond to preserve the beauty and vitality of our neighborhoods.

To support this effort, the Department of Public Works and Transportation (DPW&T) hosts the event each spring and fall, providing logistical support, plastic gloves, trash bags, safety vests, up to 6 bags of mulch and litter grabbers for registrants. Growing Green with Pride also presents an opportunity for Prince George's County students to receive community service credits.







The Vision Zero Strategy



- In 2019 the county launched Vision Zero Prince George's to make our streets safe for everyone by 2040 and to eliminate all traffic fatalities and severe injuries, while increasing safe, healthy, equitable mobility for all road users based on the USDOT Safe System Approach.
- From 2020 to 2022, more than 300 pedestrians and bicyclists
 were killed or severely injured in car crashes within Prince
 George's County. The County consistently has the most roadway
 fatalities of any county in Maryland and any jurisdiction in the
 Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments (MWCOG).
- The Vision Zero Initiative is currently updating the Action Plan.

 Plan as we move to the next stage in the action plan development process.



Opened


Operating a normal weekday schedule with services subject to some weather delays.

Limited

Operating a normal weekday schedule but expect delays of up to 30-minutes depending on road conditions and/or curtailment of service on some portions of the route and/or cancellation of all service on some routes. "Limited" services are considered emergency operations due to weather.

Closed

Transit will not operate or will cease operations for a specified period of time. "Closed" services are considered emergency operations due to weather.









Contracted Tree Trimming



The Tree Team is doing amazing work reducing PGC311 requests and addressing storm events!

- OHM oversees the trimming and removal of trees within the rights-of-way, responding to requests aimed at enhancing sight distance.
- In FY2024, the number of trees trimmed surged from 8,690 in FY2023 to 24,130, largely due to the engagement of additional contractors for emergency removals and unscheduled trimming
 - With over 3,342 trees removed and replaced during the same period.
- OHM is continuing to develop strategic processes and exploring new contracts to address tree trimming 311 requests.





Litter Contractor Services



- OHM maintains an aggressive litter control and collection program for addressing litter complaints; including trash, debris, illegal dumping, and illegal signs located in the public right-of-way.
- On average, DPW&T receives approximately (90)
 PGC311 service requests for litter complaints and illegal dumping each week.
- The number of litter requests decreased from 4,549 in FY2023 to 4,120 in FY2024 resulting in an annual decrease of 9.4 percent.
- Over 9,780 miles of roadway were serviced in the litter control program during this reporting period.

Blizzard Operation

Salting operation with less than 2 inches of snow

Service Priority



- 1. Pretreat primary and collector roads prior to snow event
- 2. Plow and treat primary and collector roads during snowfall
- 3. Move to plow and treat residential roadways after snowfall ends
- 4. Cul-de-sacs and dead-end roadways
- 5. Clear all roadways to "Complete" condition

Work in 12 hours shifts / 24 hours a day



Communicating Road Conditions




- Snow Districts report road conditions to the Command Center twice per operational period. Information is collected from drivers and inspectors.
- 2. Automatic Vehicle Locator (AVL) staff track and report the status of individual trucks and overall progress of operations.
- 3. Command Staff move resources or, if applicable, call-in additional snow resources.
- 4. Public Information Officers use social media and DPW&T website to keep the public informed of progress and instructions.




Identify Snow Route Map and Area of Property








